

A Sabbath Year

The LORD said to Moses on Mount Sinai, ² "Say to the people of Israel, When you come into the land which I give you, the land shall keep a sabbath to the LORD. ³ Six years you shall sow your field, and six years you shall prune your vineyard, and gather in its fruits; ⁴ but in the seventh year there shall be a sabbath of solemn rest for the land, a sabbath to the LORD." [Lv. 25, 2-4]

This Thanksgiving marks the beginning of our seventh year since we arrived in New Braunfels, and since the MDM was "born". Intense years of much work, many challenges and many blessings. But now we begin this "Sabbath Year" for us. We feel the Lord wants us to temporarily diminish some of the other activities we've had, in order to focus on some other areas, such as:

Formation of new members. Having a new group of young men living with us is a little like a family with a new child. It both constrains one, demanding a great deal of time and energy, and at the same time brings a new dimension of grace, joy, and activity. It is important that we attend to their formation, but also that we just spend time with them over meals or playing sports or just catching up on how the day went.

Liturgy of the Holy Eucharist. We want to make some improvements and changes to our celebration of the Mass and the Divine Office, and that takes time. More on this later.

Dwellings for our Community at the Mission. In order to receive vocations (especially for the women) it is more and more urgent that we establish living quarters for the Community at the Mission. We are also badly in need of an all-weather Chapel and want to provide quarters for visiting priests.

Because of these very good but also very time-consuming developments we will be restricting our apostolic activities next spring to our regularly scheduled events. Pray for us! Please God, we are laying a foundation materially and spiritually that will permit Jesus' Mercy to flow out into the Hill Country for years to come....*


I, the Second Person of the Most Holy Trinity, became man, a mortal man, through love of you, for love of the human race, fallen because of sin.



On September 15th, Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows, Sister Magdalene received the title of **Mother Magdalene**. •




New Program for Home-schooled Boys



Matt: The past two and a half months with the St. Gabriel Institute and the Mission of Divine Mercy has been a true answer to my prayers of the last few years. For about two years I have had a desire for "something more." Both the unity amongst the men of the Institute and the personal spiritual growth, in union with MDM, have filled this void.

The St. Gabriel Institute has allowed me to venture out of the herd of material success that this world has convinced me to follow. I have always been

FROM FATHER JOHN MARY:

The Saint Gabriel's Institute [SGI] is a response to two needs that we've sensed for a long time.

First, young people need a chance to discern what their own calling is in life. Especially, they need to be able to discover God's unique will for them in their life. He is the only One Who really knows what they were created for. But that is not easy to do in the situation most of them find themselves in. As a priest, how often do I meet people who deeply regret not having had some more guidance before they made certain decisions that altered their lives.

Second, young people need to prepare themselves spiritually and morally for their future and for eternity. There are great spiritual challenges awaiting them, whether as married or single persons working in the world, or in religious life or in the priesthood. That takes serious spiritual formation. And rarely do they get it. Often the focus for young men is on academics or a career. But the formation of the soul is sorely deficient. And that is the most necessary.

The SGI gives young men a chance to dedicate a semester to the Lord; to discern His Will; and to be formed to better carry out their own mission.

In the articles that follow we've let our SGIs speak for themselves about their experience so far. •

told that the definition of success is to go to school, get a high paying job, get married, and have kids. Then, and only then, will I be successful. SGI has given me an avenue to explore other options.

Even though I am only part time this semester and commute from St. Mary's University on the weekends, it has been great living with Rafa, Joe, and Antony and their individually weird personalities. I've never lived with anyone who continually sings Latin songs stuck in his head, or lectures me on how High Fructose Corn Syrup can be spiritually damaging, or enjoys cleaning the bathrooms with such fortitude naming the task a "sacrifice."





Some Saturdays each of us shared our testimony. Their testimonies really had an impact on me and made me respect them more and love them like they were my brothers.

I can say that it's only been two months and I can see very clearly how God is shaping me to be a better person and a better Christian. So far my experience here at the SGI has been one of the best decisions that I have ever made in my life. •







Antony: This semester three other young men and myself have decided to devote our lives to God. To do this we took time away from school, family and friends and have been living with the Mission of Divine Mercy. You may wonder how we were able to tear ourselves away from the world, but I can't answer that question. I have no idea how we were able to do it; the only logical possibility is that God has showered us with graces. This is what I think has happened.

The average college student is not longing for a semester of prayer, theological study and manual labor. Neither was I at the beginning of this summer. I realized, though, that I needed to finally quit putting God off and really listen to what He wants me to do. By taking this chance, He has been able to work wonders in me and the guys around me. concrete thing I have been able to see this semester is **the power of prayer.** I spend a lot of my time praying for my friends and family and through this I have been told about and witnessed my prayers being answered.

During this semester I have been able to slow down and begin to appreciate a simpler life. I am not always worried about where I need to be or what I should be doing. Simple manual labor, daily exercise, eating right, actually sleeping—and three other guys doing the same thing—has been extremely beneficial. Never before in my life have I not com-

plained about waking up at six o'clock, then—without someone telling me—gone to pray for an hour, then gone to Mass, all in silence.




mentioned to me his idea of starting a program that would give young men a semester or two to seek God's Will for their lives. Since my only plans for post-high school education involved riding a motorcycle across the country I thought I could make time for it.

I matured through my senior year and by its end felt that nothing else had any true worth but a life for God. This feeling did not change my anxiety over what people

would think or my dim view of the priesthood. I was scheduled to attend the St. Michael summer camps in July, and the days leading up to them were the height of the anxiety. But the first day out at the Mission I was filled with awe and peace and had no memory of all my previous feelings. This continued through the three weeks. I went home trusting in Jesus like never before.

I arrived for the SGI this September with a longing to give my life to Christ. Living with the Mission has allowed me to give God the time needed to reveal to me His call and plans. Here we live intimately with the Lord and have a chance to discover what is deepest in us. The joy that will become of our lives on earth and eternally is priceless and a gift that can only be found in the Lord. Here in this time the Lord has revealed to me His gift of a religious vocation and I am truly happy. •

Within the week everything began to fall into place. Obstacles disappeared, permits were granted, and by the end of the first week of October they were beginning to frame the building.
