

FROM FR. JOHN MARY:

"Come away by yourselves to a quiet place and rest a while." (Mk 6, 31)

s Our Lord making this invitation to you?

Life is often stressful. We can feel overwhelmed. Worn down. Worn out. Burnt out. At the end of our rope....

Our Lord wants us to be able to rest; to rest in Him.

There's a passage from the Gospel that I would like to put on billboards across the country:

"Come to Me, all you who labor and are weary, and I will give you rest for your souls." (Mt 11, 28-29)

It's not easy to find rest for our soul.

It is in Him that our soul, our heart finds rest.

That is what we want to offer here at the Mission.

A quiet place to rest in Jesus.

But you can't always come here.
Where can you find this "quiet place" in your daily life?

That is what prayer can be.

Sometimes prayer just seems to be one more obligation that we have to try to squeeze into a day that is already too full. Trying to fulfill this or that prayer practice can add to our fatigue.

But this simple act of "resting in the Lord" is not another burden we are adding. It is a time to give Him our burdens. What is more restful than being with someone who truly understands you and loves you? And welcomes you. And listens.

It can take many forms. Spending time with the Blessed Sacrament. Taking a walk with the Lord. Just sitting outside. Or inside. Or lying down. Praying peacefully some decades of the Rosary. Or chaplet. Praying a psalm. Just talking to Him. Or listening. Or simply being quietly with Him.

Not worrying about doing something or accomplishing something. But just resting with Him. What a joy it is for Him to be able to give you this rest.

Pope of the Divine Mercy

"Right from the beginning of my ministry in St. Peter's See in Rome I considered this message my special task. Providence has assigned it to me in the present situation of man, the Church, and the world." (John Paul II, Nov. 22, 1981)

s the Church gathers on April 27th to officially canonize Pope John Paul II there will be a multitude of tributes to his

greatness and holiness. But it would seem that no designation will be as important as the one which God Himself assigned to him both in life and in eternity; and which he himself recognized as the purpose of his papacy. He is the Pope of the Divine Mercy.

As a young man working in the quarry outside Krakow during the Nazi occupation, he would have been in sight of the Convent Sister where **Faustina** Kowalska was receiving the Revelations of Divine He would learn Mercy. about these revelations when he began to study secretly for the Priesthood in 1940. Later as a Priest and then as a young Bishop he would frequently pray in the Convent Chapel.

In 1959, due to errors in the translation, the Church formally prohibited the propagation of Sister Faustina's messages. The young Archbishop of Krakow, however, approached the Vatican in the early sixties during the Council. Despite the fact that the prohibition was still in place, he was able to argue for and to initiate the process for her beatification.

Archbishop Wojtyla became a Cardinal in 1978. In April of that year, due to overwhelming evidence, the prohibition against the messages was finally lifted. Then on October


> 16, Cardinal Wojtyla became His Holiness, John Paul II. The Revelations of Divine Mercy now had a most powerful champion, and the two would become inextricably bound as the Church approached the Third Millenium.


> This Message of Mercy would undergird the twenty -seven years of his papacy: From its articulation in his second encyclical, DIVES IN MISERICORDIA (1980), through his great millennial 2000, when he, himself, would be the Pope to preside over the canonization of St. Faustina; and to declare Divine Mercy Sunday to be a universal Feast of the Church. "This," he said, "is the happiest day of my life."

From the beginning and throughout his pontificate he has been such a profound inspiration for what would become the Mission of Divine Mercy.

FIRST MILESTONE! GOAL AND DATE SET FOR GROUNDBREAKING



It will take place at the conclusion of the 10 AM Mass, and will be one of the highlights of that special day of prayer and festivities. We hope that many of you, our friends and supporters, will join us for this very important milestone.


As this newsletter goes to print we have reached our goal of having \$900,000 in the bank, which is half of the initial estimated cost of building the Center.

The funds raised for the O'Callaghan Center come from a wide range of individuals. They represent gifts of love and support for the work of the Mission of Divine Mercy, and of love and appreciation for the Priesthood of

Msgr. Eugene O'Callaghan. As former Pastor of Sts. Peter & Paul Parish, it was Msgr. O'Callaghan who first welcomed and gave support to the newly formed Mission of Divine Mercy. His Priesthood became a providential refuge for this fledgling Mission.

And so on January 25 it was an honor for the Mission to host a special luncheon which friends of Monsignor O'Callaghan organized in thanksgiving for his almost sixty years (2015) of Priesthood. In the midst of several days of cold, wet weather, the sun chose to come out that morning in celebration of the occasion, and smiled on Monsignor as he blessed the site of the future retreat center that will bear his name. The luncheon raised over \$50,000 in his honor, which will be donated to help finance the construction of the Center.





... Going Like Hotcakes

The Rediscovery of the Power of Sacramentals

e are having a hard time keeping our Sacramentals Shed stocked. With the increasing number of people discovering the Mission, and with the Saturday morning retreats occurring almost every weekend, the Shed is emptied practically before we can place the new items on the shelves.

Why is this? Perhaps it is because Christians today are becoming more and more painfully aware of the supernatural battle that envelops our world, and of the spiritual warfare that is required of us.

In mid-twentieth century America the public arena was still inhabited by a residue of traditional Judaeo-Christian morality and civic virtue. Most people had no first-hand experience of the occult; and the devil — even in Christian circles — seemed like an embarrassingly archaic persona.

The next half century saw an explosive change. With the cultural revolution of the sixties the enemy emerged in all his lethal glamour, intersecting with and contaminating every part of our culture. He has frequently become the silent partner in business, medicine, education and government. He is the acclaimed protagonist in entertainment, music, art and – especially - youth literature.

(As a high school teacher in the midnineties I remember being struck by something. Most of my generation seemed to have had childhoods untouched by any overt exBy Mother Magdalene

perience of the demonic. So it was a distressing discovery to learn that it was not an uncommon experience in the lives of the younger generation; and that these experiences frequently dated back to early childhood.)

> These days people are aware of protecting their material homes against pollutants — black mold, lead

poisoning, asbestos. But the critical issue today is preternatural contamination.

In AN EXORCIST TELLS HIS STORY, Father Gabriel Amorth, chief exorcist of Rome at the time, cites a large number of **potential occult contaminants that can be found in most contemporary homes.** In addition to obviously occult and/or new age items, they can include - among other things – tv shows, videos,

cds, magazines, posters, esoteric images, art, some product labels, and certain toys, games, books.

The best defense, of course, is a good offense; and in this case there is only One: Jesus Crucified. But while most Catholics recognize the Sacraments as Channels of His Sanctifying Grace and Power, they are much less aware of the Grace of Sacramentals.

As we approach Lent in this Spring of 2014 it is a good time to discover, or to rediscover, these great supernatural resources. •

First, what are Sacramentals?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church says: "These are sacred signs which bear a resemblance to the Sacraments. They signify effects, particularly of a spiritual nature, which are obtained through the intercession of the Church. By them...various occasions in life are rendered holy." (CCC, Second Edition, #1667)

In other words, through the blessing of the Priest, they transcend their simple material identity and become vessels of Divine Grace.

Commonly recognized Sacramentals include the Crucifix; the Rosary; the Scapular; religious medals; religious statues and images; as well as the humble elements of salt, oil, water and wax when blessed by a Priest.

Mission Sacramentals — the high-octane variety:

Every few weeks Father Moses will bless the new batch of salt, water, olive oil (Blessed Oil must be olive oil) and candles. What is striking for anyone who is present for this is the blessing itself that is used. Because Fr. Moses is using an ancient formula that includes a prayer of material exorcism. There is a solemn prayer that is specific to each of the four elements. [See excerpts in sidebar.] The Priest casts out any potential evil presence from that element and then by the power of Jesus Christ blesses the item and commands that it bear forth that Presence, dispelling any demonic influence wherever it is used.

How to Use Sacramentals

As the ads say, "Get creative!" There's no limit to the number of ways the Holy Spirit may prompt different individuals to use Sacramentals; but for those who are new to this concept we give some examples.



Dumbly and fearfully do we pray to You, O Lord, and we ask You to look with favor on this salt and water which You created.



Blessed (exorcised) Candles;

- 1. Can be lit when there is **threat of physical danger**, such as a storm.
- 2. Can be lit when one senses a malevolent or oppressive presence, or unusual irritation or discord in a home or place.
- 3. Can be lit **during prayer time** to sanctify the physical space and to accompany one's prayer.

Blessed (exorcised) Water;

- 1. It can be sprinkled anywhere to dispel a malevolent or oppressive presence. (Stealth mode: Pour it into a plant mister and then go through one's home, office, workspace, car, etc., and "freshen" or "hydrate" the air.)
- 2. One can sip a little (or a lot) of this if one is feeling particularly irritated, trou-

- **bled, depressed, tempted**. (Materially it is just bottled water to which a few particles of Blessed Salt have been added.)
- 3. One can quietly freshen the drink of a troubled spouse or child with a few drops of Blessed Water. In all seriousness this may help to dispel or at least clarify where the problem lies.
- 4. And, of course, it is very beneficial to have a Holy Water Font (remember those?) or two in the home where one can bless oneself during the day.
- 5. Very beneficial: for the Father (or Mother if the Father isn't present) to make the Sign of the Cross with Holy Water on the forehead of the Mother and children before bed at night.

Blessed (exorcised) Salt;

- 1. Just as a matter of course, **replace your regular table salt** with Blessed Salt; also use Blessed Salt to cook with.
- 2. Salt is the most materially stable of the three elements of water, oil, and salt. It survives. Therefore it is a good Sacramental to use for long-term jobs such as blessing a location. One can sprinkle Blessed Salt around the baseboards of each room in a home; or in a workplace; or one can sprinkle it around the borders of a new property.

[Just this past week we heard from a woman who has struggled for years with a debilitating infirmity and an accompanying depression. She'd just started using the Blessed Salt on her food and said immediately that she felt "100% better". It wasn't that her health issues had disappeared but that the emotional oppression had lifted.]

Blessed (exorcised) Oil;

Blessed Oil must be *olive oil*. No other kind of oil can be used. Materially it is olive oil with a few added particles of Blessed Salt. Therefore it can be used wherever one would use olive oil. But you don't want to misuse it.

- 1. For example, you can put a few drops of Blessed Oil into a salad dressing, a recipe, or something that you are frying. But you wouldn't want to pour your bottle of Blessed Oil in the skillet, fry up a batch of french fries, and then dump the leftover Oil in the garbage or down the drain.
- 2. When we have had to wipe up some residue of Blessed Oil with paper towels we save those and later burn them. The traditional way to dispose of any Blessed Oil (like any oil, Blessed Oil can eventually become rancid if stored too long), Salt, or Water is to either burn it (the oil-soaked paper towels) or to find a space outside that's away from a foot path and pour it out.
- 3. You can use Blessed Oil to make the Sign of the Cross on practically anything and everything: Over the doors and windows of a house; on the steering wheel and tires of a vehicle; on the headboard or posts of a bed; on a musical instrument or a garage tool, etc..

As noted earlier, every aspect of human life can be sanctified by the use of Sacramentals. And the Christian who honors these Sacramentals, wears them, or introduces them into his domestic or professional world, amplifies his role as a Christ-Bearer and helps to come against the powers of "this present darkness." Amen. •

THE GREAT PASSAGE: A TRIDUUM RETREAT AT THE MISSION

The period of time between the Vigil of Holy Thursday and the Easter Vigil is known as the Triduum. This short time is the most important liturgical time of the Church year. It is an intense spiritual journey during which we accompany Jesus, the Blessed Mother and the Disciples through the Last Supper, the Passion, the Death and the Resurrection. It is our salvation history in brief. And this year we want to offer you the opportunity to live it in a new way.

This year the Mission is going to offer a Triduum Retreat that will begin Holy Thursday evening and continue through Easter Sunday morning. It will include the traditional liturgical events of the Triduum as well as the special Mission events - the Walking Way of the Cross on Friday morning; the Vigil of the Sorrowful Mother on Saturday morning; and opportunities for Confession. All of these are opened to the public whether or not they've committed themselves to the Retreat.

But there will also be certain events specifically for those who have registered to make the commitment as Retreatants. These will include special talks, periods of meditation, and certain meals at the Mission.

In living this year's Triduum as a three-day retreat, we encourage you to give God the entire period, much as you would on an ACTS or Cursillo retreat. Unfortunately, we don't yet have the facilities to allow people to lodge on the Mission grounds. This means that people will either have to return to their homes at night or go to a nearby motel. While these may not be ideal retreat conditions, even this sacrifice can be offered to Jesus, and can become part of this journey with and for Him.

We do want to stress the fact that the retreat schedule is flexible. We know that there may be family or other obligations that you may need to attend to. You are free to come and go as you please.

As Chaplain to the Traditional Latin Mass community of the Archdiocese, Fr. Moses will offer the following services at the Mission during the Triduum:

PASSIO ET MORTE DOMINI

A unique opportunity this Good Friday.... Have you ever wondered how the Franciscan missionaries used to live Good Friday at the San Antonio Missions? Or how St. Therese of Lisieux, St. Maximilian Kolbe, Padre Pio, and so many other saints lived this day? This Good Friday, beginning at 1PM, we will offer a traditional chanted Service of the Passion, entirely in Gregorian Chant, and so entirely in Latin, with Latin-English booklets available to follow the readings and prayers.

The service will be long: over two hours long. The chanting of the passion alone is more than 30 minutes. The extended chants are meant to facilitate meditation on the great mystery of Our Lord's Passion and death—in some ways akin to the experience of a Holy Hour spent meditating on that great mystery. While this can be a rich spiritual experience, it will be long and is probably not for everyone. For many of you our morning Way of the Cross will probably be more conducive to entering into these great mysteries.

MISSA SOLEMNIS VIGILIAE PASCHALIS

Beginning at 10:30PM on Holy Saturday Fr. Moses will be offering a Solemn Vigil Mass in the traditional Form—entirely in Latin with all of the chants in Gregorian Chant. It is a beautiful service, and one that has been requested by families in both San Antonio and Austin who are drawn to the Traditional Latin Mass, but is a long service—over two hours long. You are welcome to attend, but many may find the Easter morning Mass—which will be primarily in English—more accessible. •


Modest Dress at the Mission

One Family's Divine Mercy Sunday

ne woman wrote to us about the impact on her family when they visited the Mission last spring on Divine Mercy Sunday. Because of a Parish commitment they'd missed the first part of the day, but she'd been able to come with her husband and three children in the afternoon for the Holy Hour:


...We got there late but we got there. My husband too; he'd never been there before. It was so beautiful. We got to adore Jesus, and to hear the Archbishop speak; and even though we missed saying the Chaplet I felt at peace. I knew we would pray it on the way home.

Leaving, as we got to the end of the long road, we received a Gift from God; our car filled with the fragrance of incense just like in the procession with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. My children and my husband all noticed it. We prayed. And when we got home we got out of the car and just lay in the grass.

Our children later went outside and started praying the Rosary on their own---what a miracle! My son wanted to read from my new copy of St. Faustina's Diary. I told him that it was hard reading; he pushed through, though, sounding out the words.

...Three years ago God told me that all I have to worry about is my kids. God has done great things for me. He is answering my prayers. He loves us. We just have to trust and seek his Will. Amen. *










- Welcoming guest Priest Fr. John Francis Bentley.


- Preparing lodgings for new vocations.

ost of you know our old friend the TENT. Many of you have enjoyed a meal under the TENT or sat at one of the picnic tables and shared some experience with a friend. The TENT has watched as our Mission children have grown and has seen many of them go off to college or the armed forces. It has celebrated the arrival of newborns and has witnessed several engagements. The TENT has celebrated Community anniversaries, Fr. Moses' ordination, and welcomed Brother Mikael's first yows.

It has not always been easy for the TENT. The summer sun and the ice storms of the winter have caused major damage to the old and fragile material. Like a wounded warrior it has remained faithful and is still standing, but it is now damaged beyond repair.

We will be sad to see our faithful old friend retire but we have reached a point where our TENT must give way to a more functional structure.

After much discussion the decision has been made to add a PAVILION to the Master Plan of the Mission. The pavilion will be separate from the O'Callaghan Center and will provide an outdoor location for meals and talks. It will permit different group activities to occur simultaneously.

The 40' x 60' pavilion will be located in the meadow just down from the camp house. It will contain a large fire place, and a small separate kitchen where food items can be prepared and warmed. The pavilion and kitchen will be connected by a covered walkway.

Our estimate for this project is in the neighborhood of 70K. Funding will be difficult since we will not take funds from the O'Callaghan Center to finance this construction.
