A fter our year-long Lent and the non-Triduum of 2020, the High Feasts of this Spring, here at the Mission, were intensely appreciated and celebrated.


When we were building our outdoor Sanctuary in the Summer of 2017, we had no idea how important it would become for us. But God did.


And it was precisely because we had already built the Teocalli that we were able, during this year of Covid, to welcome all who wanted to attend our outdoor Masses.

But the providential nature of this hillside Sanctuary truly manifested itself this Spring when we celebrated every Paschal service outdoors: The evening Vigil of Holy Thursday; the walking Way of the Cross and, later, the Service of the Passion on Good Friday; Saturday morning's Rosary with Our Lady of Sorrows; the pre-dawn lighting of the new Paschal Fire on Easter followed by the Mass of the Resurrection; and finally the glorious celebration of Divine Mercy Sunday when over 500 people gathered on the hillside to adore, rejoice in and to be saturated with the outpouring of His Divine Mercy.

In his homily on Divine Mercy Sunday, Fr. John Mary reflected on our experience of this past year --- the fear, the confusion, the darkness. "When we are lost, confused, and frightened; when we don't know where we are or where to go, then we need directions. We need a road map. And that is what the Father has given us. This is what Jesus is. He is the Map, the Path, the Direction. He is the Way, the Truth and the Life given to us by the Father. And given especially for these dark times."



"Trusting in God is not hopelessness; it is a strategy. One given to us by God. Our victory over the world is our faith in Jesus. That is how we will be victorious."




A Mirror vs. the Image


Once again, thank you to the volunteers that make this Mission possible. God bless you all! •

Finally accepting the fact that the restrictions may remain in place for the foreseeable future, and anxious to be welcoming more people to the Mission, we have decided to offer our Saturday half-day retreats beginning next September.
